BETHLEHEM, IN: Named for Bethlehem, PA, the first settlers arrived in 1805 and platted the town in 1812.

Having a steamboat and ferry landing, and a road to New Washington and Lexington, Bethlehem became a major transportation center. By 1833, 300 people lived in the town.

Many of Bethlehem's early buildings, including a canning factory, gristmill, and sawmill, have been destroyed by fires, floods and tornados. The main house of the Abbott-Holloway Farm (NRHP) is one of only three buildings built before 1840 that still stand in the town.

Since 1947 a special USPS cancellation stamp is available. In December, 5,000-7,000 letters may be mailed out, when during the rest of the year 100 letters is considered a busier than usual day.
