"Old Ox" Roads and Creeks are not named for a famous bovine. Rather, "Ox" is the Anglicized version of the name of Delaware Indian Chief Amo'chk (sounds like "ah mox").

Amo'chk was likely one of the four chiefs to sign the Treaty of Grouseland on Aug. 21, 1805 - in which Wm. Henry Harrison purchased rights for expanded U.S. settlement in Southern Indiana and other areas. By the way, the chief's name actually means "beaver," not "ox."
